| Sacrifices in the Old Testament - a reminder of their sin | Jesus's ultimate sacrifice is the payment for sin (Hebrews 10:1-10) |
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| Food laws in the Old Testament - an instruction that they were to follow in order to be set apart and pure | Jesus purifies hearts ultimately fulfilling the purity rules (Mark 7:14-23) |
| David- king and deliverer of Israel | Jesus, who is the Messianic descendant of David, is the true King, eternal, and the great and mighty deliverer who saves all people from sin and death (Luke 20:41-44; Acts 2:22-36) |
| Moses- leader of God's people and prophet | Jesus, who is God, speaks directly from the Father and leads His people to a right relationship with Him (John 6:46; 8:38; Acts 3:22; 7:37). |

- B. Author: Who wrote Mark?
 - 1. Anonymous
 - 2. Both internal and external sources evidence that this gospel account came from Mark.
 - 3. Papias: three important claims³:
 - a) Mark wrote this gospel that bears his name
 - b) Mark didn't witness these events first hand, but got his information from Peter
 - c) The lack of rhetorical order in Mark reflections Peter's preaching that was occasional in nature
- C. Origin: Where was Mark written? Rome
- D. Date: When was Mark written? between the late 50's to the 60's A.D.
- E. Audience: To whom was Mark written? a fairly broad gentile audience

- F. Is Mark 16:9-20 Authentic? "Most likely, someone else composed this longer ending to supplement what was felt to be an inadequate ending to Mark's gospel."
- G. Purpose: Why was Mark written? Carson and Moo offer these four purposes⁵:
 - 1. To inform his audience who Jesus is -
 - 2. To clarify what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ -
 - 3. To serve as a historical record -
 - 4. To urge evangelism -

³⁵ And James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came up to him and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." ³⁶ And he said to them, "What do you want me to do for you?" ³⁷ And they said to him, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." ³⁸ Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" ³⁹ And they said to him, "We are able." And Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink, and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized, ⁴⁰ but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared." ⁴¹ And when the ten heard it, they began to be indignant at James and John. ⁴² And Jesus called them to him and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. ⁴³ But it shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, ^[d] ⁴⁴ and whoever would be first among you must be slave ^[g] of all. ⁴⁵ For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."
